Thanks to a generous contribution from a Collegiate grandparent, Lower School students have recently had the enriching experience of working with a composer, an opportunity coordinated by music teachers Patsy Hallett and Beth Tracy. During the fall, students learned about

composition and composers of different styles and periods. In December they were asked to vote on their favorite composition from a group of six young contemporary composers. These composers were graduate students, budding composers who have already won contests in this area. One composer, Jason Freeman, was selected, based on his piece "In-In-The." He was notified and arrangements were made for him to visit the school in late January.

On Jan. 25-26, Mr. Freeman worked with the Lower School students, telling of the creative process involved in writing music and sharing his life story as he realized his interest in composing. All students had an opportunity to "assist" him by providing their own ideas and suggestions for a new piece of music. This piece will be written specifically for the Lower School performance groups (4th Grade chorus, string ensemble, 4th Grade band) and will be premiered May 17 at the Spring Concert.

During Mr. Freeman's first visit, the students were exhilarated, not only by their participation and involvement, but by their

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ownership; they understood that they would forever be linked to this composition. The invaluable lessons learned by meeting such an artist will follow through in other areas as well, since the creative process is so important in all aspects of a student's education.

Mr. Freeman has now returned to New York City, where he is a doctoral candidate at Columbia University. He will return to our campus in May to help with the presentation of his work.
